



# Goldfuß-Museum unterwegs

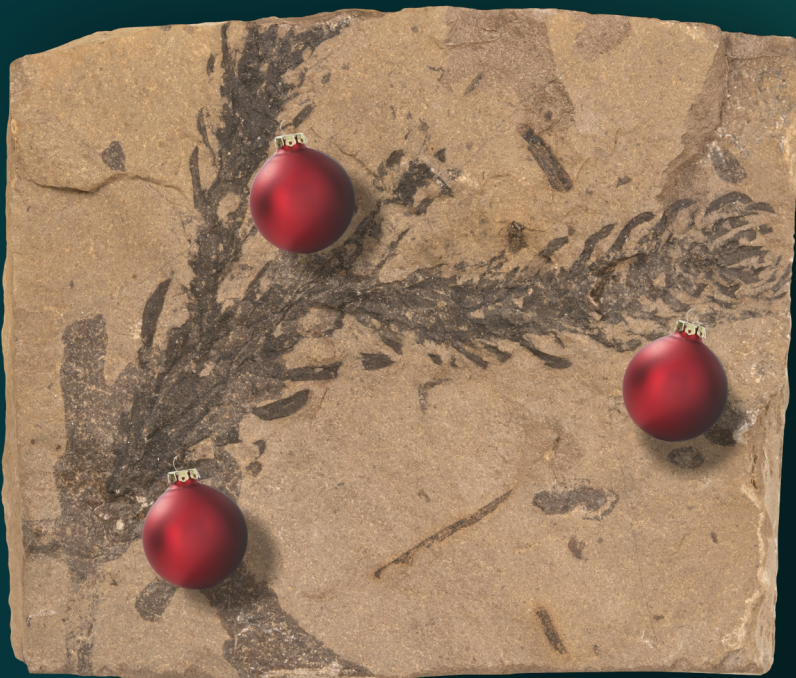
The oldest natural history museum in the Rhineland...

*is an extinct seed plant that is considered the ancestor of today's conifers. This specimen comes from the upper shell limestone of the Triassic period and is therefore already 240 million years old. Despite (or perhaps because of) its great age, this particularly beautiful and well-preserved fossil is so enchanting that you may well be tempted to travel back in time.*
